

MOTION by Mary Martin to accept the Insurance Policies on page 13 as presented. SECONDED by Sandy Caines. MOTION PASSED.

MOTION by Mary Martin to accept the Audit Report as presented on page 3. SECONDED by James Pritchard. MOTION PASSED

Requested by Fr. Petite that the discussion on the Budget be contained to half and hour.

MOTION by Cynthia Watts that voting on the Budget for 1987 be done by secret ballot following the discussion. SECONDED by Mary Cunningham. MOTION DEFEATED by show of hands.

Great discussion took place concerning the presented Budget and in particular the increase for property and Music Program. It was felt that the Parish has a heavy load now and that increases would be a burden to handle.

MOTION by Mary Martin to accept the Budget as presented. SECONDED by Susan Harris. MOTION PASSED.

John Swaine thanked Fr. Petite for his help and support during his years as Warden. MOTION by John Swaine to accept the report as presented. SECONDED by Susan Harris. MOTION PASSED

A questionnaire from the Diocese must be completed at a Special Council Meeting which be called to look after this matter.

Mr. Borgal suggested a microphone be used in the hall for Annual Meetings as it is difficult for people in the back to hear.

John Swaine is to be appointed Extraordinary Minister of the Sacrament if approved by the Bishop.

Although our bank balance shows in the black, we actually ended the year in the red of \$2,669.66, which you will see on the Budget sheet as shortfall. This amount has been added to our 1988 Budget. All 1987 invoices have been paid in full and our commitments to the Diocese and the mortgage company are also up to date.

This is the first year in many that we are able to start off without having to face two large debts. The St. George's Foundation loan of approximately \$123,000.00 (which was co-signed by our parish) has been paid by the Government and the bank interest forgiven by the bank. The allotment and extension fund arrears with the Diocese of approximately \$94,000.00 has also been forgiven. We sincerely thank all those who were involved in bringing this about -- because of this our plans for the future of the parish are now a reality.

We were sorry to lose the Chairman of our Finance committee, Mary Martin, however we wish her every success with her new position in Toronto.

One very important thing for you to be aware of and pleased about, (myself certainly, as of all parishioners I perhaps did most of the complaining) is the new dedication and outlook of our Sexton and his wife, Leonard and Susan Morash. During the summer months Leonard took on the large task of repainting the Sexton's cottage which meant no labour expense to the church. Also, in the past the gas used for the snowblower was paid for by the parish, as well as necessary replacements of belts, pins etc. Leonard has taken on the responsibility and now donates these items out of his own pocket.

Also, during the winter months, he and his father have had the parking lot professionally plowed at their expense. The cleaning of the Upper Hall (in particular) is being done regularly and we are now proud when the people from visiting parishes join us on Saturday for the Soup Kitchen. On behalf of the parish I would like to thank Leonard and his family for their dedication and should this continue I recommend an increase for 1989.

Our Rectory continued to bring in revenue and we are happy to report that Daisy McDonald and her family remain as the tenants. We also continue to have regular tenants in the Upper White Camel quarters -- Canadian Parents for French -- and provide space, at a very minimal cost, to Alanon and 7th Step groups for their weekly meetings.

As you are no doubt aware, we also continue to provide space for our own Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and, recently added to these, the Brownies for girls.

As you know, we also provide a meal for the homeless each and every Saturday which can be moved to Hope Cottage premises when the Ladies Guild have an opportunity to cater for a function.

Additionally, we are hoping that we will be able to rent our parking lot on Maitland Street in the near future and thereby add to our rental income.

Weekly Envelope Information

Holding weekly envelopes is certainly a commitment on every parishioners' part and it is the only way we can stay on top of our expenses. It is, therefore, essential that all envelopes are returned -- not just on the Sundays you come to church. Although we received many pledges that were on the bottom of the Time and Talent Sheets, the amounts that were recorded as to what would be given each and every week are not being fulfilled. Again I stress, in order for us to continue to pay our bills and meet our other commitments on time -- such promises must be kept.

We began 1987 with 193 families on the parish list, with 171 being envelope holders. During 1987 we added 25 new families and 20 of them took envelopes.

We ended 1987 with 212 families on the parish list and 185 envelope holders. Of the 185 only 85 envelopes are used regularly, 70 used periodically and 30 are not used at all.

Rector's Report, Parish of St. George 1987

The Reverend Robert Petite

One of the goals with our Annual Report this year seems to be keeping the reports as short as possible, so I won't write the usual five or six pages. That means I will have to thank all of you as a group for working so hard in the Parish. Actually, there are so many people involved in making everything work around St. George's that I would be certain to forget someone. This way am let off the hook. Thank you for the great work you are doing!

I think one of the best things we did during the year was the Five year Proposal. This project involved input from virtually every member of the Parish who cared to contribute to its content. It clearly indicated not only the many resources we already have in the Parish but provided a vision for the future as well. It is and will continue be a very useful tool in introducing the Parish to new members and in keeping us on track in the years ahead. It will be important for us not to leave The Proposal filed away in our desks but to establish a well organized effort to implement the many recommendations it contains. You will also recall that the publication of The Proposal was followed up by Parish visits with an aim to encourage people to use their time and talent in the work of the Parish. Many of you have returned time and talent sheets and we hope to involve everyone in some aspect of the ministry at St. George's.

Every time we open a Newspaper or look at the Television these days one is a faced with the terrible tragedy of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS). We all have a personal responsibility to become informed about this disease and the Church has a very important ministry to perform in the midst of this health crisis. Many of you know that I have been involved in providing Pastoral Care to Persons with AIDS through The Victoria General Hospital's Pastoral Care Department. I am also Vice-Chariman of The Metro Area Committee On AIDS and have appeared in the media from time to time in response to this crisis. This work has taken a good deal of the my time and energy. I have a strong commitment to this work and I hope the Parish feels committed to this Ministry as well. The work I do, I do on your behalf. May I also take time to indicate my gratitude to the Parish as a whole for supporting me in this work and for the times when many of you have spoken to me privately to indicate your concern and interest. I was also very heartened by the numbers of people in the Parish who attended the play Warm Wind In China in support of The Metro Area Committee On AIDS.

In 1987 we took on a considerable fiscal responsibility by increasing the budget substantially over the previous year. Our main interest in doing this was to provide more funds for the Parish Musical Program and to complete necessary repairs on the property. The way in which we hoped to gain additional funds was through the free will offerings of our people. I am very pleased to find that our faith was not ill placed. The free will offerings at St. George's increased by some \$5,000.00 dollars in 1987. This fact not only indicates that we have the resources to do what we want to do as a Parish, but also that the people of St. George's are committed to the plans which the Parish Council outlined to them at the last Annual Meeting. I am also pleased that the Parish has been relieved of the contingent liability undertaken by The St. George's Foundation and that the Diocese has forgiven the Parish \$94,000.00 of allotment arrears. We have not begun a new fiscal season in a better financial situation for many years.

The challenge in the coming year will be in implementing some of the ideas outlined in The Five Year Proposal. I would suggest that each committee chairperson and organization consider the relevant passages in the Proposal which pertain to their area of ministry and discuss ways in which suggestions may be implemented.

The North End Area Council will be attempting a religious census in the new year and the information gathered will provide a great opportunity for the Parish to reach new Anglicans who have moved into our area. This will be the special responsibility of the Publicity Committee but we will be needing the help of our Parishioners to gather census information.

We will also have to consider ways to welcome and involve new people who have already joined us and who will join us in 1988.

I sincerely believe the future of the Parish is very bright. People have been working very hard and we hope God will bless our efforts. He seems to have done so thus far. I hope and pray we all have a good year ahead of us. Thank you again for your support and work at St. George's.

At our Annual Meeting in February of 1987, St. George's parish met to take stock of the preceding year in the time-honoured way of such Annual Meetings. However, we also began the important process of looking seriously at our hopes for the parish and planning for its future. The budget at that time reflected some of these hopes. For example, money was set aside for much needed property expenditures and for the Music Director.

In the spring a panel discussion was sponsored by the spiritual Development Committee to propose some ideas about the future of the parish and the Planning for the Future Campaign was launched in the fall. This campaign was designed to encourage the prayerful consideration by all of us of our contributions to the parish in every way -- time, money and talent.

Looking back over the year we can see many ways in which this programme has already borne fruit. Envelope giving has grown and new people have come forward to offer their talents and time, side by side with those who have served so faithfully already. It has been gratifying to see the recent growth in attendance at our Sunday morning services and to learn that a number of these newcomers have become envelope holders.

The year is ending on a particularly encouraging note. The contingent liability hanging over the parish due to expenditures undertaken by the St. George's Foundation no longer threatens us since the Provincial Government has paid the outstanding account and the interest has been forgiven by the bank. Furthermore, our allotment arrears, owed to the Diocese, have been forgiven since we have indicated our good intentions by paying allotment faithfully for the last three years.

The outlook for our parish seems promising if we continue to exercise careful stewardship over all that God has given to us in this place and in our lives.

I suspect that most people who regularly attend St. George's agree with me about this, since many signed the petitition concerning the Prayer Book that was recently circulated. Please let me and other members of the committee know what your thoughts are on this matter and do not hesitate to pass on any suggestions that you may have.

Amos Westropp, a new member to our group, received a cross and blue ribbon representing his one year served at St. George's and two in his previous parish. ST. GEORGE'S CHURCH SCHOOL

This has been an encouraging year for the St. George's Church hool. We are still a relatively small group but the number of tudents each week has increased from approximately 6 last year to 9 to 10 this year. I have hopes that two former members will return.

There is still only one teacher, so the Sunday classes are arried on in one group, with student ages ranging from 4 to 11 years age. This does cause the occasional problem, but the group is remarkably cohesive, the older students helping the younger and usually) being patient when the younger members need special attention. I believe the younger ones are benefiting from the classes; they certainly give every sign of enjoying them.

The curriculum is basically unchanged from last year: a mix of prayers, Bible reading (now from the New Testament), songs, discussion of moral problems, explanation of Anglican belief and worship and creative activities which grow out of our discussions. Every session consists of at least four of these elements. Normally, the class spends the last twenty minutes of each session in the church, with the congregation, so as to learn about our worship first-hand.

Once again this year, our pre-Christmas activities were largely directed towards presentation of a Christmas "show", comprised of songs and short dramatic pieces. Once again, our presentation was quite successful, being staged in the church during the Fourth Sunday in Advent Eucharist. The children received a good deal of praise for their efforts.

Our "Spring Term" activities have been devoted to the creation of a video film with a Christian message. The script has been provided by one of the students, sets and costumes have been made, and filming of the actual production is currently underway. We hope to show this film (entitled The Dragon and Mr. Develin) to the congregation during one of the church's Sunday coffee gatherings, and, if it is good enough, make copies available to other Church Schools in the Diocese.

This year, we began what we hope will be an ongoing practice of taking the children into church for the whole Eucharist service once every few weeks, and incorporating their presence into the service itself -- a kind of Young People's Service. Scheduling of these special occasions is now being worked out.

As the number of children grows, I hope we will be able to divide our group into two: One Senior class and one Junior. When that happens, another teacher will be needed. Also, an Assistant Director of the Church School (to help the Director occasionally and take that the charge when he is forced to be absent) is still very much needed.

For the present, however, the Church School is happy and busy. I hope to see it grow even more in the coming year.

An effort has been made during the past year to accumulate a library of standard anthems, motets, hymns and service settings and it is hoped this will be able to continue in the coming years.

A number of new choiristers joined us during the year including Jennifer Bell, Anna Erikson, Gwyneth Morgan, Carla Swansburg and Jane Westropp. We were also able to welcome back to the choir stalls Stephen Burns, Carol Kemp, Terry McLaughlin, Charles Reagh and Janet Ross. Resignations were received from Susan Clare Cameron, Michelle Huett and Jane Reagh but it is hoped that they will be able to join us again soon. The most notable change in personnel involved the loss of Michal King as our organist. Michal "retired" from her position in January, 1987 and her presence is missed, although we enjoy her support as a singer in the congregation.

I wish to congratulate the congregation in its efforts to sing the congregational music in our services. The singing "from below" is getting stronger and more self assured and I am hopeful that the impetus may continue.

In closing, I wish to thank all those who helped with the "drink table" as an effort to raise money for the music of our church; but most especially Robert and Mary Martin, Lynn Palmer and Larry Stephan who endeavour to keep the cellar well stocked. I also wish to thank Rachel DeWolf-Swetnam for providing the table with a splendid new sign advertising these efforts. (Sometime we will have a congregational rehearsal in order to learn how to sing it!)

As well they have participated in annual scouting events such as BP Week activities, Trees for Canada, Operation Alert, Apple Day and Skateree.

Special events included a year end closing campfire/barbecue on the church lawn last May and Scotia Jamb '87 Provincial Jamboree hald in July which was attended by 10 of our scouts and three 2nd Halifax Leaders. A highlight was the Halifax North District Church Parade in April drawing Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Venturers and Scouters together at St. George's for a church service to honour Saint George, Patron Saint of Scouting (as well as of our Church). This may become an annual event.

Fundraising is always a necessary sideline of the Scouting Programme. Again in 1987 St. George's parishioners have supported all our campaigns (Cheese sale, Trees for canada, Apple Day, Pop Sale and currently our Pen Sale) which, in turn, support different levels of Boys Scouts of Canada, from world brotherhood to our own sections. The Saint George's Society of Halifax again provided support through the personal donations of its members.

One of the reasons we are able to offer an active programme to boys, ages 5 to 14, is because of the commitment of several St. George's members who continue to offer their services as a form of their christian stewardship. We can count on Karen Wheeler to keep finances in order as our Treasurer. Don Connors was instrumental in reactivating our 2nd Halifax Charter over 5 years ago and has contributed both on Group Committee and as Leader since that time. Not the least of these people is Joyce Brown who has completed 5 years as Akela for the Pack. Now in her 6th season with Cubs she has turned over the position of Akela to the capable hands of Bruce Archibald. Congratulations Joyce on receiving your 5 year service pin from Scouts Canada and thank you for your commitment to our Cubs.

"PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE" STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE - 1987.

As the parish continued in its pattern of growth and consolidation, it became evident to the Council that efforts should be made to help parishioners to become aware of their individual contributions to this growth. A chair was selected, a steward-ship committee put in place and the work started.

The goals were to increase awareness, potential and participation of individuals in parish life. This started with notices in Church, then surveys or interviews with groups and individuals about their views concerning the potential directions of the parish over the next several years. The material assembled was consolidated and published as a sixteen page booklet about the parish entitled "Planning for the Future". This booklet contained parish history, recent growth and proposed plans for the future.

With the help of the Gabriel Guild and the Young Alexandra Society of King College, a very successful parish brunch was sponsored so that this proposal could be presented and discussed with the congregation. Parishioners were also encouraged to complete a "Time and Talent" survey indicating areas in which they would be willing to assist with more than sixty different kinds of responsibilities within the parish. These were compiled into a 'Talent Bank' book given to the Rector and to Council; names of those willing to help with various projects were given to those responsible for committees or special projects. A number of recommendations about service needs and issues have been given to the Rector and committee heads.

This was the first such stewardship program in the parish for some time and it was successful because of the keen interest our parishioners have in the future of our parish. All those who participated and all those who helped have been enriched by the gifts and talents given to them by God.
