Parish of St George Minutes of the Annual General Meeting 17 March 2013

Opening Prayer: Fr. Westhaver (chair)

Approval of the Minutes

John Hammond moved the approval of the Minutes for the previous AGM (18 March 2012). John Swaine seconded. Carried.

Business Arising from the Minutes

Rector's Report

Fr. Westhaver remarked that the Annual Report displays the fruits of the spirit in the parish's various ministries, in the little things that everybody does. He urged us to love one another.

He then drew attention to an old picture of the hall, noting that he and those at the table with him were sitting under a newly restored arch, emblematic of the changes that have occurred. He reminded us of the parish's aim to make the hall attractive, accessible, and functional. He noted the hall's new roof, new drainage system, new foundation, and new oil tanks. The kitchen and adjoining storage area have been radically upgraded, and a wheelchair ramp has been added. Also, insulation and ventilation systems have been put in place. All of the work, he affirmed, has been done to a very high standard. The parish has raised \$300,000 of the \$800,000 projected already, without an official fundraising campaign. There have been many gifts-in-kind. He praised Karen and Steve Bezanson, and Jimmy Benedict, for their work on behalf of the parish.

Fr. Westhaver then acknowledged that the departure of a Rector poses challenges for fundraising; he emphasized, though, that the parish has a clear commitment to its various ministries (for which the hall exists). A restored hall will also bring new possibilities. He encouraged us to look to the future in a hope anchored in Christ; this, he added, is the basic principle of the spiritual life. He spoke of the grace of God working in extraordinary ways, but also of the references in the Lenten readings to devils and to malign spiritual opposition. We can expect this opposition even with respect to the hall and the parish's ministries. Lastly, he drew attention to those individuals who make up the Hall Steering Committee, Anne West, Mary Martin, John Swaine, and the Wardens, Kevin Gibson, Jane Mills, and Gwynedd Picket.

<u>Discussion/Response</u>: **Elizabeth Jones** said that it was heart-warming to read the Annual Report, but that there were two people who aren't mentioned: envelope secretary Jennifer Dyck and head counter Elizabeth Haigh. On behalf of the parish, she expressed great gratitude for their work behind the scenes.

Jan Connors drew attention to the Income and Expense Statements, saying that these were there for people to read, but that she wasn't going to go through them. She thanked all those involved for their diligence and for the sacrificial giving that allowed the parish to end the year in the black. Fr. Westhaver thanked Jan for her work, which she did (along with Dan Sargeant) with "tremendous efficiency and good will."

Anne West moved that the Annual Report, along with the Financial Statements, be received. Lowell Perry seconded. Carried.

Budget

The proposed budget was circulated as a separate document. Jan Connors remarked that it was a budget "we could live with." The Income figures are lower than 2012's budget and slightly under the actual figures for 2012. 'Designated offerings' have been adjusted to be more in line with what comes in; this figure too is slightly under what was projected last year. Jan noted that the amount for 'grant income' reflects two figures: funds received from CMHC and from a grant for a summer student (if we can get it).

On the expense side of things, Jan noted that a central consideration was the Diocese's minimum stipend for Rectors (including benefits), which included a natural increase. She also noted that she has separated out all monies related to the hall project; these funds are not included in the regular operating expenses. (20% of electricity, oil, and water bills have been allocated to the hall project for the work done.) She explained that the \$100 budgeted for office manager is a token amount; in fact, it is through the generosity of the Friends of St George's that the parish's office manager is paid; the Friends have also covered a portion of the Rector's and Music Director's salaries. The Priest-Assistant has also received funds from the Friends. Jan also said that the parish has a mechanism for separating out the HST charged on expenses for the hall project.

<u>Discussion</u>: **Daniel Watson** remarked that in Scripture it is forbidden to charge interest on money lent, except in the case of enemies. He spoke of the new covenant and the fact that now we are called to love our enemies. He also noted the opinion of the early church fathers on the subject. He acknowledged that this is the way the world works, but also asked, if the world jumped off a cliff, would we too? He suggested that perhaps we could, at least, come to see our dependence on money earned on interest as a problem. Jan Connors clarified that while the parish does earn interest, it does not charge it. **Lowell Perry** asked whether money given to the hall project is subject to allotment charges. Jan Connors responded that the parish is entitled to apply for an exemption for particular projects; she expected the Diocese to be supportive. She added that many repair costs are already allotment exempt.

Jan Connors moved the acceptance of the 2013 Budget as presented. Stan Armstrong seconded. Carried.

Elections

One name was added to the list of nominations: Heather Jensen for Parish Council. Fr. Westhaver noted that Jeffrey Reed was retiring as Parish Archivist.

Lowell Perry moved that the nominations list, with additions, be approved. Jacquie de Mestral seconded. Carried.

Other Business

Fr. Westhaver welcomed the new members of Parish Council, and new Warden Gwynedd Pickett.

He thanked Sheila Jackson for her work as Warden, highlighting her very important work in helping the kitchen project forward. He thanked Mike Himmelman, Duncan Moram, and Laurelle LeVert for their service on Parish Council. He thanked Jane Mills and Kevin Gibson for their continuing work as Wardens. He also thanked envelope secretary Jennifer Dyck for her very detailed work done with great diligence, Betty Haigh and the counters, and Parish Council secretary Darren Dyck. He thanked Mary Hills for her hospitality work, Jens Jensen for his work as Property Committee Chair, and Garth MacPhee for the inspirational and prayerful offerings to the church, and for his leadership. Lastly, he thanked Elisabeth Kleven for coordinating "so many things."

Jane Mills offered her sincere thanks to Fr. Westhaver on behalf of the parish.

Fr Purchase's Report

To the Wardens and Members of Parish Council and Parishioners:

Once again, it has been my joy and privilege to share in the Ministry at St George's. My report falls into two sections: **Pastoral Visitor Report** (January 1st - June 30th), and **Priest-in-Charge Report** (July 1st - December 31st).

Pastoral Visitor

St George's is a very busy and active Parish with a number of various ministries, many under the capable leadership of lay people. However, there are a number of pastoral and sacramental ministries that are the responsibility of the Parish priest. My ministry as pastoral visitor was to assist Father Westhaver in carrying out these ministries so that he may also have time for the administrative responsibilities that came his way as well.

This part-time Ministry involves Hospital Visits, Home and Hospital Communions, and occasionally celebrating the Eucharist at St George's, assisting as Deacon, and Preaching. I have also assisted at Funerals.

I have been "on-call" occasionally while the Rector has been able to have a day off with his family, and when he has been sick. It has been a joy and privilege to once again share with you in this Ministry for the first half of the year.

I was most happy to do this and took up this responsibility effective July 1st.

Ordination: On June 11th, the Feast of St Barnabas, Vivien Hannon, a long-time, faithful parishioner of St George's was ordained a Deacon in the Church of God, and later on December 6th, the Feast of St Nicholas, she was ordained Priest. She has been assisting Father John Morrell at my home Parish of St Mark's Church. The ordinations took place at the Cathedral Church of All Saints. We thank God for Vivien's ministry among us before her ordination, and we pray for God's continued blessing upon her.

The period between the resignation of a Rector and the arrival of a new one implies a change in the general routine of Parish life – things are not the same as before. During this period of transition, the ministry of the lay leadership becomes very important, and St George's is certainly blessed with a goodly number of lay people ready and willing to carry out the work of the Parish. A great burden has been carried by the **Parish Wardens**: Kevin Gibson, Jane Mills and Gwynedd Pickett. Because of their love of St George's, they have worked hard and carried out their responsibilities with

His work with the **Junior Choir** has brought great joy to all of us and what a delight it is when they grace us with their presence. There are not enough words to express our gratitude to the **Adult Choir** for all they contribute to the beauty and holiness of our worship. One cannot leave St George's without feeling uplifted and

filled with awe. I know they love to sing, but such beauty and inspiration does not come without hard work and dedication. What a wonderful gift all of you have.

Many thanks to Andrea Lee and the teachers in our **Sunday School**. It is wonderful seeing all the young people in church, and I especially enjoy looking at some of their work when they come to the altar rail. I hope the children have as good feelings about "church" as I had when I was their age (and still do). It is so important that we make them feel loved and an important part of the Church Family.

What a joy it is to have our **Hard of Hearing and Deaf Parishioners** worship with us on Sundays and Wednesdays. Special thanks to our interpreters who come faithfully. We truly appreciate your ministry among us.

The **Spiritual Development Committee**, under the chairmanship of Susan Harris, worked hard to organize and arrange all the special services and events during the year and made my time with you much easier.

A debt of gratitude is offered to all those who faithfully officiate at Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer each day of the week. Because of your ministry the words of Hymn 27 ring true: "The voice of prayer is never silent, nor dies the strain of praise away."

What a joy it is to arrive at church on Sundays, Wednesdays, and other Holy Days and have everything cleaned, pressed and ready for worship – not to mention the

shining brass (please notice even the pew numbers glisten). My thanks to Tracy Lenfesty and the members of the **Altar Guild and Brass Cleaning Group** for their care and devotion to the worship of God. Vaila Mowat is like the Prophetess Anna, who "...departed not from the temple, but served God...night and day." Vaila has been so devoted for all the years I have known her, and is a great help to me.

Jim Rawding and John Krell deserve our thanks as well. Toilets are cleaned, floors vacuumed (and washed), pews dusted, etc, etc, etc – all for our benefit week by week. Sasha, the dog, is there to help as well. **Janitorial duties** often go un-noticed (until something goes wrong!) So a big "tip of the hat" to these two. Their biggest enemy right now is *road salt*, so let's help by wiping our feet at the door.

The grounds of the Church and Hall have been immaculate thanks to the people of **Edmonds**. What Church property looks like on the outside speaks volumes of the people inside – it speaks not only of the holiness of the place, but also the reverence the congregation has towards God. The people of Edmonds are very dedicated and certainly take wonderful care of the "image" of St George's. It is a tremendous offering to God, as well as to us. Much of the renovation in the Church Hall was carried out by them last winter, and what a transformation it has been so far. It is still a work-in-progress, and hopefully when the new Rector comes, it will continue. A tremendous applause to Willis and Ada Grandy, Patricia Martinson, and others who pass out the bulletin and worship books and greet people with a smile and word of welcome.

Many parishioners continue to be very active in our **Outreach Programs**: the Saturday Soup Kitchen, Fellowship Hour after church, Christmas hampers, Seafarers' Shoe Boxes, YouthNet after-school and meals for school children, support of Feed Nova Scotia, and so on. All of these are ways of fulfilling the Gospel message of salvation – small ways to bring healing to our world and community.

St George's **YouthNet** continues to be a vital ministry and we are most grateful to our Directors, first Carolyn Carson and now Alex Zachernuk, and all the staff who run such an excellent program for the young people. Congratulations to the young people in YouthNet who belong to "Hope Blooms!" You certainly were the stars of "Dragon's Den" on TV last fall. All the best in your future endeavours.

If I have forgotten anyone or any group, I apologize, but do want you to know how much I appreciate what everyone at St George's has done to help with all that takes place in this Parish. Without all of you, using the gifts and talents God has given, the ministries in this place would be lacking. A VERY BIG thank you to all the faithful **parishioners** who grace us with your presence Sunday by Sunday, and contribute financially to the Parish. Without you, the work of St George's would just not happen. To each and every one of you, our gratitude for your dedication. And my personal thanks for your loving support and friendship towards me throughout this interim, but especially during the death of my stepmother. Thank you for your cards and letters of sympathy, and for your contributions to St George's YouthNet and Hope Cottage. It was also very comforting and supportive to see so many of you at the Mass of Christian Burial at St Theresa's Church. God bless you!

Warden's Report

The past year was one of unexpected sorrow and joy. As we said farewell to Father Westhaver and his family last summer, the wardens and parish council, with the guidance and encouragement of Father Purchase, worked closely together to ensure that the many opportunities for worship, outreach, and fellowship within Saint George's and our community continued without interruption. The daily round of offices, the regular celebration of Holy Communion, and the observance of the festivals of the church year continued, along with the many activities and programmes which are central to our parish life. The resilience of Saint George's is illustrated throughout this Annual Report, and we are thankful for the dedication of parishioners to the continuity of our parish life.

Following our last Annual General Meeting we were joined by four parishioners in a Parochial Committee, which has worked diligently over many months to identify a new Rector. We thank Susan Harris, Tracy Lenfesty, and Benjamin Lee for sharing our work in this Committee, and we remember John Hammond, whose death occurred before our work was finished. We give thanks for his life and his faithful work with us. We are pleased to report that the Committee has now successfully concluded its work, and that the appointment of our new Rector will be announced on 16th March, before the Annual General Meeting.

Notwithstanding the changes within the parish, much important work has continued and new initiatives have flourished. As we awaited the arrival of a new Rector, active work to renovate our Parish Hall, begun in earnest last winter, was scaled back. However, important planning and preliminary fundraising continued quietly through the dedicated efforts of several volunteers, and we thank Anne West, Jens Jensen, John Swaine, and Mary Martin for their work to ensure that the parish will be able to resume work quickly upon the appointment of our new Rector. In addition, the stewardship of our facilities has continued through the implementation of a comprehensive cleaning and organization system to ensure that our Hall remains a place of welcome and a benefit to all who use it. Thanks to the gift of a generous donor, work is also underway to install a new fire safety system in the Hall, which will accommodate the configuration of new spaces that will be created in the next phases of the renovation. One of those new spaces will be dedicated to new accessible washrooms adjacent to our main Hall, and we are planning for construction to begin shortly.

The parish has also found new opportunities for fellowship and outreach. In light of the growing number of families in the parish, a very successful family retreat, led by Dr Ranall Ingalls of Trinity Church in Saint John, was organized last autumn, and plans are being made for regular retreats for parents and children in the parish. We note as well the recent establishment of the St George's Consort by our dedicated Director of Music, which was formally welcomed by parish council early in the year. This new ensemble, which includes several musicians from the parish, will reside in and be associated with Saint George's to promote the spiritual life of our parish and the surrounding community through music. We hope that the audience which filled the Round Church at the Consort's first concert, held on 26th January, is a sign of wonderful things to come.

We note with sadness the death of longtime parishioner and former assistant priest Father Eldie Richard. We are thankful for his faithfulness and love of the parish. May he rest in peace.

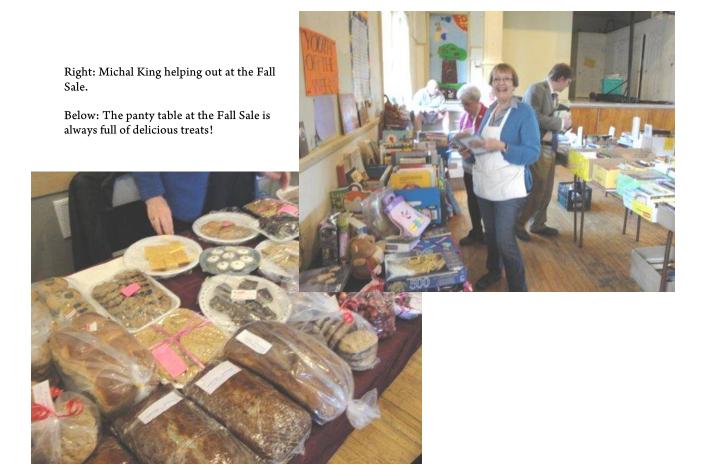

5S Report

One development in the hall over the last year is the implementation of the 5S system, an internationally-used method of organizing a work space to maximize efficiency and functionality. This system includes sorting, setting in place, shining, standardizing, and sustaining, and at St George's is fundamentally a practice of good stewardship: ensuring that our hall is well cared for, so that it can be a place of welcome and a benefit to all who use it in support of the life of our parish and community. Last spring, there was a complete purge and sorting of items throughout the hall, and all the common areas underwent a deep cleaning. We then set in motion a maintenance cleaning routine, which involved members of Trinity House, several parishioners, and employees from Edmonds. Since the summer, 5S inspections have been conducted weekly, and these continue to provide feedback to users so that everyone can be working towards the common goal of caring for this beautiful and historic building in the midst of its renovation. All regular hall users and groups have made consistent efforts to keep the hall in good shape, and many parishioners have commented on the resulting improvements to the cleanliness and orderliness of the space.

Sincere thanks are due to the Edmonds family for the generous donation of their company's resources to assist in the coordination and labour of this initiative.



Standing Committee Reports

Report of the Spiritual Development Committee

This committee met a number of times in 2014 to consider Christian Education programmes in the parish and to make the usual pre-Holy Week/Easter and pre-Advent/Christmas preparations.

In February, Father Westhaver announced his resignation as Rector, in order to become Principal of Pusey House, Oxford, effective the end of June. We were very sad to lose him but very thankful for his love and guidance over the past six years. We sent our prayers and best wishes with him, as well as with Karen and Clara and Charlotte, as he took up this new position and as they moved back to the U.K. We were delighted that Father Jim Purchase was named Priest in Charge (again!) during the interim period between Rectors.

Nicholas Hatt stepped down as Chair of this Committee in the spring of 2013. We are grateful for his thoughtful leadership during his tenure as Chair. Following Karen Westhaver's departure, Andrea Lee has taken over as Sunday School Coordinator. We are thankful to Karen for her commitment to the children and grateful to Andrea for taking on this important role.

Benjamin Lee and Fr. Westhaver continued adult study sessions on Sundays from 9:15-10 a.m. until the end of Lent 2013, focusing on St Augustine's *Confessions*. After a break, the study resumed in the summer led by Benjamin, moving to the evening, which allowed greater time for group discussion. This series continued into the fall. We are grateful to Benjamin, and also to Jacquie de Mestral for hosting this group in her home. A Women's Bible Study was led by Jane Mills, held at the home of Wendy Himmelman, and we are thankful to both Jane and Wendy. We also thank Gary Woolgar for conducting a Bible Study.

Since this was Fr Westhaver's final Holy Week at St George's, he decided to preach at all of the services, other than Good Friday. On Good Friday, we had seven parishioners offer their reflections about the Seven Last Words from the Cross. We thank Alex Easton, Betty Haigh, Jan Connors, Benjamin Lee, Stan Armstrong, Daniel Watson and Autumn Essington for agreeing to speak. As in the past two years, a special service

was held in the Little Dutch Church on Easter Monday morning to mark the anniversary of its dedication to St George. On this day, we remember with thanksgiving the founding members of our parish and recollect their faithful worship of God in this place in its earliest days.

In celebration of the 10th anniversary of the Létourneau organ at St George's, a Gala Organ Concert and *Orgel Probe* was held on Sunday, April 14th. Prior to the concert, Garth MacPhee provided a splendid presentation about the organ (the *Orgel Probe*), which included a video of its interior. He was joined in the concert by Tempest Baroque Orchestra. This was a glorious and very well-attended concert. (No doubt Garth will cover this at greater length in his report.)

On the weekend of April 26th – 28th, Fr. Westhaver conducted a retreat at Covenant Place, Head of Chezzetcook on the topic of E.B. Pusey and Scripture: Background and Context. At this retreat, Fr.

Westhaver spoke on the writings of this great figure of the Oxford Movement, on whom his doctoral thesis focused. Tracy Lenfesty kindly looked after organizing the food. We thank Tracy vom Hagen and Elisabeth Kleven for making the arrangements.

A Quiet Day was conducted at St Michael's in Petite Riviere in early September. Fr. Gordon Neish, a former Priest Assistant at St George's, gave a fine series of meditations on the Mystical Reading of the Psalms. The group also enjoyed lunch and quiet walks around the village and beaches in glorious fall weather and Evensong at St Mary's in Crousetown.

Following the 10:30 service on Michaelmas,
Garth offered his presentation about the
organ again, this time with a focus for the
children, though many adults attended as
well. This event, billed as "Pizza and Pipes",
was our "Welcome Back" Sunday this year.
Following Garth's presentation, everyone
adjourned to the hall for pizza and a time of fellowship.

A Family-Friendly Retreat, which took place on the weekend of October 5th-6th at St Anne's Camp was a fine new initiative, with 35 in attendance, including 14 children. Fr Ranall Ingalls, Rector of Trinity Church in Saint John, N.B., offered three addresses, based on Dorothy Sayers' *The Other Six Deadly Sins*, Kathleen Norris' *Acedia and Me*, T.S.Eliot's *Ash Wednesday*, Bruce Cockburn's *All the Diamonds*, as well as images from the Sistine Chapel and Rodin's Adam. Benjamin and Andrea Lee deserve our sincere thanks for all their planning and organization.

Our Advent programmes this year included brief sessions prior to the 10:30 service led by Nicholas Hatt and Benjamin Lee based on a series of Advent Meditations originally given by The Rev'd Dr Robert Crouse. This series helped to unfold for us the development of the lessons of this holy season. On the first three Wednesday evenings in Lent, we gathered for 5:30 Evening Prayer in the church, followed by a simple supper in the Sunday School Room, and then a presentation in the church. Fr Purchase gave the first talk, speaking about what Scripture says about the Second Coming and Judgement. Garth MacPhee led us in the second session on the music of Advent, and Sue Zinck led the third session, at which we viewed and discussed a video of a meditation about Advent given by Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury.

In 2013, we continued the practice of moving the celebration of some of the important Holy Days of the Church Year to 6 p.m. On these occasions, there is a programme for the children and they come and go to worship, just as they do on Sunday mornings. The hope is that the children will learn from this about the Feast Days of the Church. A potluck is often held following these 6 p.m. services.

The regular rhythm of twice-daily prayer in the church is so very important to our parish life. Following our Rector's departure, a regular participant in these services was no longer with us, so I want to offer a special word of gratitude on behalf of the parish to all who have continued to conduct and attend these services. We offer sincere thanks to Jacquie de Mestral, Sue Zinck, Uli vom Hagen, Stan Armstrong, Elizabeth Jones, Vaila Mowatt, Jeffrey Reed, Barbara Hodkin, Benjamin Lee and Bill Naftel. Thanks are also due to Helen Chandler and John Overton for filling in as needed. Many of us are unable to attend these small weekday services, but as we say our private prayers wherever we may be, let us remember that

we are joining in hearts and minds with those two or three gathered together and, indeed, with all Christians around the world.

In closing, I want especially to note with deep gratitude and appreciation the faithful care offered to the parish by Fr Purchase through the last six months of 2013.

Music Director's Report

2013 was an exciting and busy year for the music programme at St George's. In April we celebrated the 10th anniversary of our magnificent Létourneau organ. This milestone called to mind the extraordinary restoration of the Round Church following the fire of 1994, which culminated in the installation of the present organ in 2002. Just as the rebuilding of the church signified the Parish's renewed commitment to the surrounding community, the Létourneau organ testifies to the Parish's deep love of music.

Ten years after its completion, the organ was in need of a gentle restoration. The work was done by Létourneau at a very modest cost to the Parish, thanks to the generosity of the builder. At this time a *zimbelstern* was installed in the organ. This was made possible by generous gifts from Jacqueline de Mestral (in memory of her late husband Donald), the Rev'd Debra Burleson and her husband Christopher Purcell, and a donation from Hugh Creighton. The zimbelstern is a set of bells that ring out a cheerful *ostinato*. It was heard for the first time during the Gloria in the first Mass of Easter. The zimbelstern adds a whimsical beauty to the organ, delighting listeners with its silvery tones.

On Sunday, April 14 a Gala Organ Concert was held to celebrate the 10th anniversary. The performance featured your Director of Music playing works by Buxtehude, Bach, Liszt, Vierne and Durufle. Tempest Baroque Orchestra, led by David Greenberg, joined me in a performance of Bach's Sinfonia from Cantata 29 and the Handel Organ Concert in B-flat. The proceeds from the concert were given to the Friends of St George's Society in support of the music programme. An Orgel *Probe*, a lecture on the organ and its inner workings, preceded the concert. Létourneau technician Mr. Jocelyn Berthiaume took wonderful photos inside the organ, and these were shown during the Probe.

Thank you to the many people who helped

with the 10th anniversary celebrations, most especially members of the Friends of St George's, Roy Currie, John Mark Dawson, Cheryl Bell, Elisabeth Kleven and Matthew Stones (who provided invaluable technical support both for the *Orgel Probe* and the concert itself). The addition of Tempest to the organ concert was made possible through the generosity of a parish family.

Week by week, the St George's Choir prepares settings of the Ordinary, motets and plainsong psalms for the liturgies. The diligence and care with which they fulfill this work is admirable. The musical achievements and accomplishments of each and every singer contribute enormously to the quality of the choir. Through the past year, many new motets and settings were added to the repertoire, including the

beautiful six-voice *Missa In illo tempore* by the 17th c. master, Claudio Monteverdi, performed on Easter Sunday.

Ian Urquhart retired from the Parish Choir in October, having completed twenty years of dedicated service. A choir party was held at the home of Janet Ross and Steven Burns in his honour, at which time he was presented with a gift certificate for Lee Valley. Ian now joins his wife Trudie in the congregation, where he continues to sing 'lustily and with good courage'.

The Junior Choir continues to rehearse on Tuesdays in the Guild Room, 6-7pm. It is my privilege and delight to teach this cheerful and dedicated group of singers. Their repertoire includes a range of styles, and they have sung in French, German and Latin. In April the children participated in the Halifax Kiwanis Music Festival, receiving silver for their efforts. In late May they presented the jazz musical, 'Oh Jonah!' to a very large and enthusiastic audience. Thank you to the parents for their wonderful support, and to the Parishioners for their encouragement of the children's choir.

Toddlers' Church

Toddlers church this past year began in October after the summer break, and has run most weeks since

then. The nursery is open as soon as church begins, and our lesson starts at around the same time as the sermon, when many toddlers begin to find it difficult to pay attention in church. This year we have had from three to eight toddlers in attendance most weeks, from two up to four years of age, as well as a number of infants.

Toddlers' church lessons are tied to Bible stories and/or events in the church year, and are normally repeated for about a month with various crafts or activities. The repetition allows the children to really learn the stories and songs and make them their own, and they seem to enjoy anticipating the lesson material as much as they enjoy hearing it the first time. The goal is not so much to treat the stories systematically or draw out a moral for the children, but to let the children take in and engage with the material as directly as possible, making them part of their inner landscape. A real challenge is to present the stories so they are accessible to children of quite different abilities, from those who are just beginning to listen to those who are almost ready to go up to Sunday school.

This year we have been using two main resources for lessons. Before Christmas we returned to a lesson set used in previous years, and we covered the story of creation, the first family, the Annunciation, the trip to Bethlehem, and Jesus' birth. Since Christmas we have been using a set of simple lesson cards and have had the story of the wise men and the story of the boy Christ teaching in the temple.

Our toddlers' church theme song for this year has been "God Sees the Little Sparrow Fall".

Volunteers to teach in toddlers church are always welcome!

Sunday School

The St George's Sunday School has been a joy to work with since I began the position of Coordinator in September of 2013. From the many volunteers this year (including Mike West, Sue Zinck, Autumn Essington, Benjamin Lee, Shannon Parker, Colin Nicolle, Caliegh Davis, Tracy Lenfesty, Kieva Diamond, Vaila Mowat, Maddie West, Nadine Savoury, Kaitlyn Boulding and more!) to the bright and eager children (including Rebecca Zinck, Evan West, Tovah Vom Hagen, Rosalyn Calvin, Morag Wilson, Rosemary Wilson, Tallis Pickett, Harlow Diamond, Elizabeth Savoury, and Ann Gibson who are our regulars, and others who've been able to join in from time to time) on Sunday mornings, I am so thankful to have a part in helping with this very important aspect of St George's worship.

Besides our lessons in September, October and November where we followed some of the major stories in Genesis, we also incorporated lessons on Harvest Thanksgiving, St Michael and All Angels, All Souls Day, Stir-up Sunday, The Feast of St Nicholas, Advent, and the Nativity at the appropriate times. The

children have really loved acting out the Old Testament stories on which we've focused, as well as crafts and other activities that engage them in learning these lessons and all that we've covered in the fall and winter of 2013. The prayers that the children know from the BCP (primarily from the service for children beginning on page 622) have become a regular part of our routine each Sunday morning and it is encouraging to see how quickly their keen minds can memorize the prayers. I should mention that our St Nicholas' Party was a huge success, and though I was not present in the last couple of weeks of December, I'd heard that the Christmas Eve Crèche Service was also a hit. This was thanks to Sue Zinck and others who stepped in to guide the kids and assign parts, sort through costumes and lend a hand to have the service run smoothly.

St George's as they study God's word, and are immersed in the tradition of the Prayer Book through all that we do during the Sunday School each week.

Publicity & Website

Publicity carries on much has it has in years past. We continued to place ads in local newspapers at strategic times – Christmas, Easter, and in early September – to reach out to our community during those crucial seasons. Our 2013 Summer Student, Samantha Chown, brought skills in marketing and social media. Her efforts gained us a spot in the Nova Scotia Doers and Dreamers Guide for 2014, an

increased web presence, and a lively Twitter feed as she "Instagrammed" her time giving tours in the Round Church and Little Dutch Church.

When she does not have a summer student to put to work, Parish Administrator Elisabeth Kleven maintains the @stgeoround Twitter feed herself with posts about St George's and our neighbourhood, services and special events, links to liturgically relevant or newsworthy things, and the temperature of the Parish Office.

This year Parish publicity online has become a larger priority than ever before. Posters for services and events are distributed on Facebook, the Anglican NetNews, and by email, often by parishioners and volunteers. The Saint George's Facebook Group is a great place to find photos of recent events and carry on discussions with fellow parishioners. We offer a special thanks to Sue Zinck, Craig Savoury, John Overton, Karen Westhaver, and Jacquie deMestral for their contributions in 2013.

In addition to our electronic advertising, we thank parishioners for putting up our posters in their communities, telling their friends about our fundraisers, concerts, and services, and doing all they can to cast our nets widely.

Website

The Parish website, www.roundchurch.ca, underwent significant changes this year. Sarah Stevenson and Elisabeth Kleven spent much of 2013 researching, editing, and building a new website for the Parish. Though Sarah, who has faithfully built and maintained the website for years, had to step back from the project mid-year, the lion's share of the work was already done, and Elisabeth was able to finish up in time to unveil the new website on Christmas Eve 2013.

During 2013, 5,400 visitors made10,842 visits to the Parish website. (Regrettably, our data does not include December 24 – December 31, 2013, as the tracking information was not included with the website redesign until early 2014.) Our highest recorded day was February 17th, the day that Fr Westhaver announced his resignation, with 157 visitors and 646 pageviews. The following day, February 18th, we had another 87 visitors. Our

next highest were the Saturday before Palm Sunday (67 visitors), Tuesday in Holy Week (66), and Holy Saturday (66). The last two Saturdays before Advent also brought in 66 and 65 visitors, respectively.

The majority of our visitors (80%) hail from Canada, with most of the rest from the United States (4.98%), the United Kingdom (4.51%), the Netherlands (4.11%), and Italy (3.27%). Most visitors (82.62%) used a desktop computer or laptop, with 10.17% using a tablet, and the final 7.20% accessing the website on a mobile device like a smartphone.

In an average week there are approximately 215 visits to the website. Beyond the homepage, the most frequently visited parts of the site are the service schedule, upcoming events, and documents pages. This data was taken into account for the site redesign, and one of our main goals was making the information available on those pages even more helpful and accessible.

The Parish owes an enormous thanks to Sarah Stevenson for her tireless work and dedication to maintaining the old website and building the new one. We are also grateful to Andrew Pickett, who spent hours photographing the Round Church to produce the beautiful shots of the church and grounds that make the website come alive.

Sexton's Report June to December 2013

When Scott Connors and Kim Lickers moved from Trinity House in June 2013, they also ceased doing sexton duties for the Church and Hall. Between June and December, sexton duties were mainly covered by Helen Chandler & John Overton with assistance from Trinity House resident Patris; also, Gary Woolgar was primary sexton in June and part-time sexton in July.

During our tenure, Helen and I, John, have had the opportunity both to look over the explicit sexton duties – seeing them with "new eyes" – and also to embark on what has "fallen between the cracks;" we have felt that it is not the job of the Parish Administrator (PA) always to have to be the fall-back small-repair-&-tidy-up-person when jobs/tasks have been abandoned, not noticed, or just "left for someone else to do!"

We have distinguished between

- what we needed to report to the PA and/or the wardens and/or those appointed by the Parish Council as having special responsibilities for security, property, etc to get done professionally, e.g. long-standing problems to do with roof leakages, toilet faucet leakages, unfinished work with obstructions/dangers, vestry/Brunswick Street/Car-Park-Entrance doors & old-fashioned Allen-keyed bar-problems resulting in doors not closing/locking securely, anomalies in the alarm panels, etc.

and

- what we could start doing ourselves through an ongoing small repair & refurbishment/ regular inspection scheme and also what, by talking to and working with choir members, Jim Rawding who cleans the church, the Altar Guild, YouthNet and others, we could "just get done." This included many

small things that had often remained "unseen/unattended to" over the years – especially to do with moving junk out of the church, repairing/oiling locks and window-openers, replacing light-bulbs and fittings, sorting trash/recycling in Hall and Church and generally finding "proper" places for things to go; for example, a better place for the wedding carpet allowing it to be rolled out without heavy lifting over an inadequate pew-space, an adequate hook for the thurible put up in the vestry, all the vestry robe/vestment cupboards made closeable, and several door handles repaired (Jeffrey Reed is looking into the Restoration Room/Vestry door replacement parts.) In this way we were an enabling part of practical work done by many to implement the 5S's, as requested by Parish Council.

On the fire security front, Helen and the PA Lis Kleven have been involved in the locating/mapping of all the systems, bringing them up to inspection-acceptance level; all the fire extinguishers & emergency lights were checked/renewed on the same day by the fire company.

For us the sexton duty has not only been about property & people security combined with small repairs; there is also a "ministry aspect" to do with the people who come to the Church and Hall for different reasons. We have been aware that the sextons are often the first person a visiting rehearsing musician/actor/dancer, a less-churched visitor (especially at baptisms, weddings and funerals) and many others outside the "mainstream church core" will meet. We have felt a pride in being able to invite into a clean, ordered and delight-full holy space as well as being part of the personally welcoming spiritual environment. It has felt honouring to follow

someone like Scott Connors, brought up in both the liturgical and social networking of the church, for whom the meeting-of-people has been so integrated into the sexton role.

The need for at least two main sextons with back-up personnel has become recognised – the sextons are often the last people on the campus late in the evening and the first, early the next morning; to do a job like this well is made easier by having days off with sleep and recreation.

Our deepest thanks to Lis Kleven, the PA, and to Jane Mills, our primary warden connection, and to so many others for their encouragement and patience!

Whichever one of them is on duty generally stays for the coffee hour after church in order to chat with the Deaf and to facilitate conversation with hearing members of the congregation. Karen Anne and Ashley organize their own schedule and take special care to notify the parish if all of the Deaf will be away on a given Sunday. About once a month on a Friday afternoon, the Deaf Club meets in the Parish Hall, with about 20-25 people in attendance. Once again, we wish to offer thanks to George and Pauline Himmelman for driving Agnes to church on Sunday mornings. We also thank one of our Deaf members, Malcolm Brinsom, for bringing Carol and Heather to church.

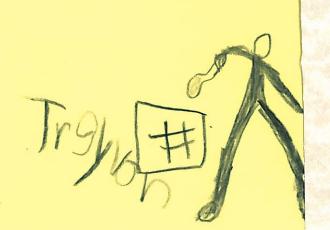

Property Matters

2013 was, like the previous couple of years, an extremely significant year regarding property concerns and actions. The following summarizes the highlights, together with a few notes concerning the direction forward on some items:

1. The Round Church:

- It is essential as a minimum to keep up the exterior fabric and operating equipment to do with the Round Church structure, which can be done with careful use of the income from the dedicated Preservation Fund. Plans to carry out a further section of painting of the exterior were deferred to enable refurbishment of the interpretive panels outdoors in the Cornwallis Street yard. As the years go by, a regular program of repainting the exterior over a three or four-year cycle would be very desirable so as to avoid large one-time expenditures for painting the whole structure at one time, should the whole be allowed to deteriorate. With the exception of addressing the heating system (see below), there should be no further large one-time calls on the Preservation Fund for the foreseeable future, so the routine of painting a section each year should be feasible in the future.
- Substantial expenditures were incurred in repair and maintenance of mechanical equipment and controls, primarily concerning the heating system. This is not surprising, as the mechanical equipment is now mostly seventeen years old, most having been replaced as part of the restoration following the 1994 fire. The service life of components such as pumps and controls is not much more than that time span, so items are coming up for replacement or major repair. It is appropriate to think of this point while considering the next point, concerning energy efficiency and noise issues.
- As has been recognized for some time, the heating plant's energy efficiency could be considerably improved by use of the newly available natural gas readily at hand, as there is a gas main



on Cornwallis Street. Also, the existing hot air distribution system is inherently noisy and the controls are difficult to operate. These matters continue to represent high expenses and inconvenience and ought to be addressed soon. The use of natural gas is significantly less expensive than oil, and estimates suggest that a payback period of less than ten years would be achievable by conversion to gas. A new system using modern air blowers, a good control system, and sound dampening ductwork would alleviate the noise and troublesome controlling of the system.

A number of less demanding repairs and improvements to the interior should be considered
when resources permit, including sanding and refinishing of the chancel floor, and further
lighting features to complement the chandelier that has recently been installed.

2. The Little Dutch Church:

- Very little work was required to the Little Dutch Church, as a major program was carried out three years ago, in which the exterior fabric and the plaster finishes inside were repaired and painted, ventilation was improved and foundation masonry was rejuvenated. That work had been funded by a costsharing grant from the Government of Canada, Parks Canada.
- Looking forward, attention should be paid soon to the deteriorated state of the dry stone wall around the whole perimeter of the grounds. Whether it is better to just leave the walls as they are is debatable. The

wall is an integral part of the heritage value of the property, which is a National Historic Site, and provides a degree of security to the ancient cemetery that occupies most of the outdoor area of the lot.

3. Trinity House (formerly the Rectory):

- By the end of 2012, the rejuvenation of the furnace and the exterior of the building represented a point at which it can be said that the needed work to bring the most of the exterior of the building up to a good state, and to provide it with a modern heating system, had been done. In 2013, nothing further of that nature was carried out. The remaining work includes improvement of doors and windows and if possible, insulation of the lower storey floor, which is positioned over an uninsulated crawl space. These issues still need to be addressed; resources in 2013 did not permit any further action.
- The interior of the building generally has been adequate, albeit quite basic, in terms of finishes and amenities, considering the requirements of the residents. The greatest need has been the condition of the bathrooms, whose finishes and fixtures have become quite old and worn. At the outset of the year, the downstairs bathroom had just been totally renovated. This significant step forward has improved living conditions for the residents. In the future, a room by room upgrade and renovation can be considered such that over time, the whole interior is brought to a high standard.

4. The Hall:

A detailed report concerning the hall renovations project is given separately, under the "Deck the Hall" heading.

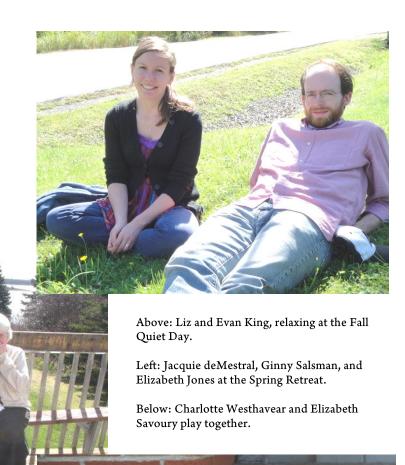
Management and Operations

In addition to the above notes, which concern structures and grounds, it is appropriate to comment on the great deal of work and attention provided by Parish staff and volunteers. Managing the property

affairs of this Parish involves care of two National Historic Sites, a residence (Trinity House), a very busy hall, and extensive grounds that require significant care to maintain their high standard, all supported by complicated administrative processes to manage their use by numerous groups.

Ordinary operating requirements are largely handled by our capable Parish Administrator, and the planning and execution of capital projects are accomplished by the Wardens and Parish Council, under the watchful eye of the Rector. Parishioners have also contributed much in donation of grounds-keeping, snow removal, preparing inventories of chattels, cleaning, and monitoring of safety and security features. Without all their good work, the Parish properties would soon become dilapidated.

Deck the Hall

The winter and spring of 2013 saw a burst of activity as Phase 2 of Deck the Hall, the multi-year renovation of our dilapidated parish hall, took place. The west (Maitland Street) end of the hall

underwent a complete facelift. Workers

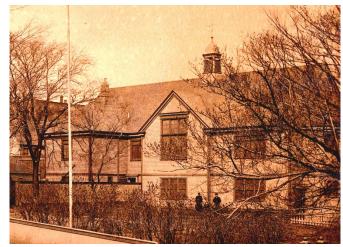
and a number of specialized sub-contractors removed asbestos, cleaned out huge quantities of rotting wood and old gyproc and blew in insulation. They built a new entrance complete with wheelchair ramp, a new stage, a utility area, a large pantry and, the crowning glory, a new commercial style kitchen complete with stainless steel counters and appliances. At the same time, efficient storage units for parish organizations were built in the lower level and preparation work was done for a new gas-fired furnace and the beautiful music space which will be created there. During the summer the foundation for the new main entrance porch was installed and as the year ended a special donation was designated to install a fire alarm system throughout the building. During 2013, parishioners gave with great generosity to pay back the loan from the parish which allowed al this work to proceed.

The parish annual meeting on March 18 provided a wonderful opportunity to celebrate our achievements. The rector, wardens and treasurer proudly conducted business from the new stage.

When Father Westhaver left, the wardens decided to stop all construction until the appointment of a new rector. However, the committee quietly continued to assemble bureaucratic building blocks. They applied to HRM's Heritage Advisory Committee for permission to replace most of the windows in the building with vinyl units. Permission was granted, on condition that the eight large windows which can be said to define the character of the building (the four windows in the south and north sides of the hall and the four windows in the music space below) be replaced with hand-crafted wooden windows matching those fitted in the hall when it was built in 1889. This means a considerable increase in height

of the two largest windows in the hall itself. These wooden windows will cost much more than vinyl windows, but we are applying to HRM's Community Grant Program for funds to cover the difference. It may be that there will be an opportunity for donors to have these windows designated as memorials. Please note that we shall do our best to ensure that the vinyl windows in the rest of the building are in keeping with the style of this Victorian building.

Phase 3 is to construct much-needed accessible washrooms in the space previously occupied by the south hall kitchen. Phase 4, for which major fundraising will be necessary, will see construction of the music space, complete with its own toilets, storage space and office for the

music director. The new furnace is an urgently-needed but as yet unscheduled item.

The year ended with Parish council voting to dedicate to Deck the Hall some memorial money received during 2013. This means that Deck the Hall has now covered its debt to the parish and has just over \$55,000 in hand for future work, plus ongoing pledges from some generous parishioners.

Parish Library
